Blessed with breathtaking scenery, unforgettable signature holes and championship caliber course design, it's no wonder why Hawaii attracts so many golfers from around the world. Discover a variety of unique course layouts on Hawaii's six, geographically distinct islands—from greens lined with volcanic rough to stunning seaside water hazards.

Hawaii Island

Hawaii Island presents an array of superb resort courses plus the finest assortment of independent (non-resort-affiliated) daily fee courses in Hawaii. Lush green fairways set amongst black volcanic rock rough help to make the courses of Hawaii Island truly unique. 16 publicly accessible golf courses are spread throughout Hawaii Island. The world-renowned Kohala Coast resorts of Waikoloa, Mauna Lani and Mauna Kea feature courses that have given the Hawaii Island the nickname, "Golf Capital of Hawaii."

Mauna Lani Resort is a luxury golf resort with two championship golf courses, Mauna Lani North and South. Both golf courses offer a challenging experience to novice and professional golf enthusiasts alike. Mauna Lani was host to the Senior Skins Golf Game for 11 years and is currently home to the Hawaii State Open that is played each December. The Big Island golf courses are masterpieces of design, each strikingly different, yet equally challenging. Each course is a world apart geographically, and in playing experience.

One of the most unique golf courses in Hawaii, Hapuna Golf Course is set in rugged desert terrain and stretches along the scenic Kohala coastline, above the western shore of the Big Island. The course is incredibly picturesque with panoramic views of the Pacific Ocean at every stage of play. A favorite with locals, Hapuna Golf Course has earned itself something of a reputation as a hidden gem. Its uniqueness is in part due to its dramatic elevation changes; the course starts at sea level and rises to some 700 feet above.

An Arnold Palmer and Ed Seay collaboration, and opened in 1992, this 18-hole, par-72 course has a links-style layout. Measuring a little under 6,900 yards, the natural contours of the locality are seamlessly incorporated into the design with due care afforded to the sensitive nature of the environment in which the course is set. With a scenic backdrop that includes the ocean and the snow-capped Mauna Kea volcano, players of all ability levels should enjoy a challenging round of golf at Hapuna.

Oahu

Oahu is home to over 40 golf courses—including five private clubs and nine military courses. In fact, there are 29 courses easily accessible to visitors at 25 different venues. These range from the very first golf course built in the islands (in 1898)—the Moanalua Golf Club's nine-hole hill-and-dale affair, which operates on a semi-private basis—to golf resorts that plays host to the PGA. Oahu also presents a wonderful array of independently operated daily fee tracks that range from par-3 courses to two of the world's most challenging layouts.

Hawaii Prince Hotel Waikiki is widely recognized for its exceptional 27-hole Hawaii Prince Golf Club. Designed by Arnold Palmer and Ed Seay, the course occupies 270 acres with stunning views of the rain-carved Waianae Range. Three interchangeable nines allow for a diverse experience for any golfer. Its long, verdant fairways are lined with 90 white-sand bunkers and 10 picturesque lakes that protect 27 manicured greens.

Turtle Bay's Two Exquisite Hawaii Golf Experiences Turtle Bay is home to two spectacular Oahu golf courses designed by some of the most prominent names in golf and architecture - Arnold Palmer and George Fazio. The original Fazio Course, with holes that meander along the coastline and which include breathtaking views of Hawaii's fabled North Shore, was crafted during the 1970's, and its classic design withstands the test of time. While the Fazio course surely proves its mettle, the gem of Turtle Bay is the renowned Palmer Course, a facility that – in addition to other impressive distinctions – is among the "Top 100 Golf Courses in the US" according to Golf Digest. With a setting that includes dense wetlands, contoured tree-lined fairways, and a crescendo to amazing ocean views from the penultimate hole, the Arnold Palmer Oahu golf course is one worthy of the bucket list.

Maui

You'll want to frame your scorecard, no matter what you shoot. Golf on Maui is that memorable. Choose from 14 courses (several of which are ranked at or near the top of the "world's best" lists) designed by noted course architects and golfing luminaries such as Arnold Palmer and Ben Crenshaw. The PGA TOUR's Hyundai Tournament of Champions is held here each year. The Magic Isle is known for its beauty—and so are its golf courses. Maui has two distinct areas where the bulk of the accommodations and golf resorts are situated. West Maui, which features the bustling old whaling village of Lahaina, delivers 36 holes at both the Kaanapali Beach Resort and the Kapalua Resort. South Maui, which lies in the wake of Haleakala, is home to two resorts, Wailea (54 holes) and Makena (36 holes). Four other Maui courses are located between in Wailuku and Pukalani.

Located on the popular island of Maui, Kapalua Golf invites you to discover two of the most majestic golf courses in the world - the Plantation Course and the Bay Course. Recognized as the best golf course in Hawaii by Golf Digest magazine, the Plantation Course is home to the PGA TOUR's Hyundai Tournament of Champions. The Bay Course has hosted over 20 professional tournaments - the most of any neighbor island course - and features the only hole to play over the ocean on Maui.

Royal Kaanapali Course, Par 71, 6700 Yards

The Royal Kaanapali Course, a Robert Trent Jones Senior design, opened in 1962 and has tested the skills of golf professionals and amateurs alike. In the fall of 2006, this challenging course received a nip/tuck renovation by renowned golf course architect, Robin Nelson. Combining wide fairways and undulating greens, the Royal Kaanapali Course is both distinctive and demanding. Recently celebrating 50 year, the Royal Course has hosted the Champions Tour, LPGA Women's Kemper Open and Shell's Wonderful World of Golf.

Kaanapali Kai Course, Par 70, 6388 Yards

The Kaanapali Kai course was also recently renovated (2005). A Par 70, this course combines narrow fairways and a need for a deft touch around the greens. With four sets of tees and keiki (kids) tees, this course is perfect for all levels of play. Many of the holes are nestled into the West Maui Mountains and have beautiful panoramic views of the neighboring islands. The Kai Course hosted the Golf Channel's #1 series, Big Break Ka'anapali in 2008.

Kauai

Kauai offers nine courses at seven golf venues ranging from Kukuilono's charming 9-hole layout with spectacular views of Niihau to resort courses that have once hosted LPGA events and the PGA of America's Grand Slam of Golf. Three major resorts dominate the Kauai golfscape: Princeville on the spectacular North Shore, which offers 45 holes at two locations (Prince & Makai), Kauai Lagoons' 36 holes (Kiele & Mokihana) nestled near the Lihue airport, and the 18-hole Poipu Bay Golf Course along Kauai's southern coastline. Independent daily fee courses are found in Poipu at Kiahuna Golf Course and in Lihue at the Puakea Golf Course.

Lanai

Lanai features The Experience at Koele, an 18-hole championship course designed by legends Greg Norman and Ted Robinson. The signature 17th hole magnificently drops into a valley more than 200 feet below the tee-box. Along the southern coast, Jack Nicklaus created one of his most famous masterpieces, The Challenge at Manele. Set along sea cliffs, this target-style course offers unsurpassed views of the Pacific Ocean. Both courses consistently rank among the best in the world by travel publications and guides.
